Animal Research

Lesson Plans: Science and Language Arts

Materials:

- About Desert
 Animals book and accompanying CD
- About Polar Animals book and accompanying CD
- About Grassland Animals book and accompanying CD
- About Rain Forest Animals book and accompanying CD
- chart paper and writing paper
- construction paper and crayons or markers for report covers
- research materials: print, online, and videos

Objectives:

Students will:

- learn about animals that live in various habitats and how they adapt to living in those places.
- undergo the research process to learn more about an animal.
- create a report based on the research, including the traits of informative writing.
- present their work and reflect on the process of writing

Get Ready to Read and Write

Engage Students

Show students photographs of animals in their natural habitats. You might choose animals from each of the four books and find images of those animals to share. Work with one photograph as a whole group. Ask: What do you know about this animal? Where does it live? Do you think it could live anywhere else in the world? Explain why or why not. Prompt students' thinking as necessary, as some may not have a lot of background knowledge. Then divide the class into small groups and give each group a photograph. Ask them to identify the animal and tell what they know about where it lives and how it survives. Allow time for them to share their thoughts. Ask how they might find out more about the animals.

Focus on Vocabulary and Concepts


Before delving into the texts and the research, focus on vocabulary. Point out that each glossary that focuses on words in that particular habitat. Focus on words that are common to studying animals and habitats to give them background.

- Camouflage Say: Camouflage is coloring that helps an animal hide in its natural surroundings. Look at
 this picture of a stick bug on page 11 of About Rain Forest Animals. See how this animal looks like a
 stick? You can hardly see it on the tree! Camouflage keeps animals safe. If a bird wanted to eat this
 bug, it might not even notice that it's sitting on the branch. Camouflage helps animals blend in.
- Features Say: Features are important facts about something. When we talk about animals, we desribe



Building Background and Introducing Context:


Ask students to identify their birthplace on the map or globe (teacher may need to do some research in advance to make sure they can guide students to birthplace if students are not familiar with a map).



Sing-Along Songs

Lesson Plans: Math, Language Arts & Music

Materials:

Book - This Old Man and accompanying CD

Word Cards and Sentence Strips

Markers or Crayons

Pre-Prep: Write a verse on each of the Sentence Strips — one for each of the numbers to 10.

Example:

Strip 1: This old man, he played one.

Strip 2: He played knickknack on my thumb.

Strip 3: This old man, he played two.

Strip 4: He played knickknack on my shoe.

And so on...

Objectives:

- Students will identify words that rhyme and belong to the same word family.
- Students will recognize numerals and number words to count to 10.
- · Students will read rhyming words as they re-build the story.
- Students will respond to music through movement.

Pre-Reading: Ask students if they can name any words that rhyme. Come up with a quick, fun list. Now, ask students if they can count to ten using their fingers. Do a quick countdown before starting the book.

Engagement: Share the book This Old Man with the CD. Explain that this book has both rhyming words and numbers. Ask children to LISTEN and LOOK carefully for the rhyming sounds they can hear as they sing along. Ask them to LISTEN and LOOK for numbers and number words, too.

Activity:


- Go through the book a second time. Can the students find the rhyming words? Write each word found on notecards and post.
- 2. Look at your list of rhyming words. Look for similarities / differences in the way the same sounds are spelled eg. two/shoe four/door what sound is the same how is this sound represented (grapheme) differently in each word? Are there any of the "rhyming words" that sound close but don't quite rhyme?
- Are any of those words number words? Ask students to write the numeral next to the number word on each card.
- Divide students into groups and give each a set of rhyming sentence strips.
 As you read the book aloud ask them to order the sentence strips by number and rhyming pair on the floor.

Transition: Play the CD and sing along following the story your students put together. Ask students to move to the music and act out what the old man is doing as they dance and sing.

Closure: As a class discuss all of the rhyming words that were found and how rhyming words might look the same but they might not. Are there any other fun rhyming words that you could use in this book?








Lesson Plan for Peaceful Leader: Martin Luther King, Jr.

Content Areas: Social Studies, Language Arts, Music, and Technology

Materials

- Peaceful Leader: Martin Luther King, Jr. book and accompanying
 CD
- · drawing paper
- crayons or markers
- online flipbook tools, such as FlipSnack, available at flipsnackedu.com

Objectives

Students will:

- · learn about and discuss the significance of Martin Luther King, Jr.
- discuss what it means to have a dream.
- · write and illustrate their own dreams.
- create an online flipbook and respond to the class's work.

GET READY TO READ

Engage students:

Ask students: What does it mean to have a dream?

Prompt if needed: There are dreams we have at night, and then there are dreams that are really ideas that we have about the way we wish things were. I have a dream, for example, that all the animals in animal shelters find families.

What is a dream or a wish that the students have? List students' ideas on the board. Tell students that Martin Luther King, Jr. was a man with a very big dream. He had a dream that all people would be treated equally no matter who they were and no matter how they looked.


Tell students: Today you are going to read a book about Martin Luther King, Jr. and find out all about his dream.



Happy Birthday/Feliz Cumpleaños

Grade Level: 1-3

Content Areas: Social Studies, Music, Visual Arts and Language Arts

Time Frame: 90 to 120 minutes, which can be split into different time periods

MATERIALS

Books about celebrations and international festivities

Drawing paper and pencils

OBJECTIVES

Students will:

- Learn customs, practices, symbols, languages and traditions of families around the world and the origins of significant days and holidays.
- Interprets information making comparisons and contrasts.
- Demonstrate appreciation for the music, dance and visual arts associated with celebrations and customs of different cultures and to learn different techniques for producing music, dance and artwork.

VOCABULARY:

Key vocabulary

Before reading, focus on vocabulary. Read the glossary words and their definitions.

Celebrate - To do something special or enjoyable for an important event, occasion, holiday, etc.

Festival - An organized series of acts and performances (usually in one place)

Customs - Something that is done regularly by a person

Origins - The point or place where something begins or is created: the source or cause of something

PROCEDURES/ACTIVITIES

Preparation:

Start by choosing books from the library or your classroom that can help students explore celebrations and international festivities. Also, create an example of a compare and contrast diagram that you would like your students to create.

Lesson Procedure:

- Start by reading <u>Happy Birthday! / Feliz Cumpleaños</u>. Go through the vocabulary as well and ask students how and why people celebrate special days and events? Have students brainstorm and list their initial answers to this question.
- Have students draw, on separate sheets of paper, images of different kinds of celebrations that are important to them or their family and list the feelings they have about each of these.
- Ask students to share their information in groups, identifying whether all students celebrate the same days and/or events and whether they have the same or different feelings about these days and/or events.
- Explore international festivities with students by completing a calendar of celebrations. Use print resource material, or discuss celebrations they have participated in. Students can draw a picture of the celebration.
- As a class, see if you can find a celebration for every month
 of the year. Think about and research the purpose of the
 celebration, when and where it occurs, what types of food are
 eaten at this time, and how people celebrate this occasion or
 event
- Explain to students how to compare and contrast two
 celebrations pointing out that similarities are just as important
 as differences. Once students understand the concept of
 comparing and contrasting have students chose two
 celebrations that they would like to research in greater detail.
- Pick two celebrations and research the similarities and differences between the two. Use a comparison and contrast diagram to help students gather and organize their information.
- If you want to go more in depth on celebrations perhaps you can celebrate with a class party. Remember that there is lots of organization that goes into preparing for a celebration.
